Alliance meeting, March 2018

On 20th March we held the seventh EU Dog & Cat Alliance meeting in Brussels. Thank you to everyone who attended – it was wonderful to have members representing 11 countries in the room and to meet some members for the first time.

Event on breeding for extremes of conformation in dogs and cats

The Alliance has been looking at ways of highlighting issues we have not been focusing on before to attract more support from MEPs and also enhance cooperation with other animal health and welfare stakeholders in Brussels. Breeding for extreme conformations is among the Alliance's areas of focus, and not only is it a very important welfare issue, but it will also provide a new angle in terms of PR, as even non-specialist MEPs, journalists, etc. can understand the suffering of dogs and cats bred with extreme features, and the need to tighten up breeding standards on this.

We plan to hold a joint event in the European Parliament with the Federation of Veterinarians of Europe (FVE) and the Federation of European Companion Animal Veterinary Associations (FECAVA) on 26th June. This will be a policy based discussion event consisting of presentations by experts across the EU as well as a short debate between stakeholders. We'd be delighted if members could attend and more information will be sent shortly.

Members' Stories!

We try to get a legal change that demands a compulsory microchipping of cats in Sweden. There is a new animal welfare act on its way this year and we hope that compulsory microchipping of cats can be included in that.

We also work against extreme breeding in pedigree dogs. For example we have seen increasing problems with more and more flat nosed dogs of certain breeds.

Finally we will start a campaign against smuggling of dogs and puppy farming, together with other animal welfare organisations and government authorities this autumn.

What developments would you like to see in EU legislation on pets?

We would like to see an EU animal welfare law that comprises pet animals, not only animal welfare rules about farm animals. Minimum standards for housing and commercial transport of dogs would be a good start.

Thinking Ahead: World Animal Day A message from Naturewatch Foundation (UK)

World Animal Day, taking place this year on 4th October, is a social movement to raise the status of animals and improve welfare standards around the globe. Animal welfare organisations, community groups, youth and children's clubs, businesses and individuals organise events in celebration of this special day to draw attention to animal issues and make them front page news around the globe – a vital catalyst for change. New guidance on pet care in Spain

This month the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Food and Environment (MAPAMA) in Spain published a guide for responsible ownership of companion animals, with the help of Alliance members ANDA, ANAA and FAADA. The Guide is aimed at all those people who want to introduce a pet into their home and encourages them to choose a pet that is suited to their lifestyle.

Higher penalties for animal cruelty offences in Poland

On January 26, the Polish Parliament adopted a bill on animal welfare proposed by the ruling Law and Justice party. The new regulations increase the upper range for those responsible for killing, illegal slaughtering or abusing an animal - from 2 to 3 years of imprisonment, while the perpetrator acting with particular cruelty will be subject to a penalty of 3 months to 5 years in prison.

The legislation also introduces a life ban on keeping animals when offenders are convicted of cruelty, bans the chaining up of dogs, and outlaws fur farms and the use of animals in circuses.



News just in from France...

There is a growing campaign for mandatory sterilisation of cats. Congressman Hervé Saulignac has called for mandatory sterilisation of stray and domestic cats, and for local authorities and local animal protection associations to be granted the necessary subsidies to do so.

Raystede (UK) in the media

Nationally, the number of animals being rehomed from rescue centres in the UK has seen a 7% decline over the last 5 years. This is due to many factors but the biggest is the internet: it has become a popular, albeit rather dangerous tool for people to buy and sell animals.

Historically Raystede had not attempted any concerted marketing drive. We decided to give this a go to see if we could increase the number of animals rehomed from us. We aimed to spread the message about the benefits of adopting an animal from Raystede. This also coincided with us launching our new-look website which is far more user-friendly.

We advertised across local radio stations, newspapers and magazines throughout January – March 2017. The key message we delivered was that all the animals in our care are vet checked, character assessed and where necessary neutered and microchipped before being rehomed. We also provide ongoing support and advice for the duration of the pet's lifetime. We also experienced a huge uplift in traffic to our new website.

The good news is, following this three-month media campaign, adoption increased by 49% https://www.raystede.org/
